Please remember, Rockefeller is a Park Preserve. That means you may very well catch sight or sound of the 202 different bird species that call Rockefeller home as well as coyotes, wolves, bears, racoons, squirrels, chipmunks, mink, turtles, deer, frogs, insects, skunk, hedgehogs, groundhogs, snakes, fish, and many other residents of the Preserve.

It also means that:

- 1) dogs must be leashed at all times
- 2) Bicycles, mechanized vehicles, drones, metal detectors, snowmobiling, camping, and open fires are strictly prohibited.

#7 Northwest Passage Tunnel

SECTOR Buttermilk

TRAIL Buttermilk Hill (BH)

GPS 41.09393 -73.84955

DESCRIPTION Wander under this stone structure to cross to

the "other side" of the Preserve. Buttermilk is idyllic part of the part often missed by visitors.

Like much of the area it has a history.



#8 USGS Benchmark and Plaque - Oldest Triangu-

lation Station in America

SECTOR Buttermilk Hill Area

TRAIL Raven's Rock (RR)

GPS 41 06 36.37123 073 48 37.47542

DESCRIPTION This 1833 plague (on the tunnel) commemo-

rates the bicentennial of the Buttermilk Hill triangulation station by the US Geologic Survey as the oldest triangulation station in America. The actual Benchmark is some .5 miles west of this plaque. (see GPS Coordinates above)



#12 Ravens Rock
SECTOR Buttermilk

TRAIL Raven's Rock (RR)

GPS 41.0964 73.8164

DESCRIPTION This destination is guaranteed to amaze you

when you reach it, even if you DO NOT see the legendary resident ghost as mentioned in "The

Legend of Sleepy Hollow".





#11 Stone Arch Creek Tunnels

SECTOR Buttermilk

TRAIL Ferguson Lake (FL)

GPS 41.098 73.82506

DESCRIPTION These interesting 3 stone arches are simply a

means to channel water, but are a nice example of the detail taken by the Rockefellers to have everything done to be consistent and unobtrusive. A single cement pipe could have been used but would overwhelm the space. Since John D. Jr was involved in most of the construction decisions, he obviously influenced

the final design.

#10 Fairy Circle
SECTOR Buttermilk

TRAIL Ferguson Lake (FL)

DESCRIPTION Nobody knows who built this little gathering

circle, but it has been there as long as we can remember. Could it be fairies gather here?





#9 Reservoir Bridge

SECTOR Buttermilk

DESCRIPTION This lovely reservoir is often missed by visitors

to the Preserve. If you trek Buttermilk, don't be

one of them. Its lovely in all seasons.

#16 Triple Arch Bridge

SECTOR Pocantico

TRAIL Big Tree Trail (BT)

GPS 41.09991 73.85619

DESCRIPTION This magnificent structure was the first triple

arch bridge built in the United States. It spans the Pocantico and provides a fantastic view of the massive Old Aqueduct Trail embankment.



#18 Spook Rock
SECTOR Pocantico

TRAIL Spook Rock Trail (SR)

GPS 41.10787 73.85315

DESCRIPTION More Sleepy Hollow legends can be found at

Spook Rock. Can you see the legendary maidens dancing around their basket atop the an-

cient Native American council rock?



#17 Hulda's Hut
SECTOR Pocantico

TRAIL Witch's Spring Trail (WS)

GPS 41.10672 -73.85236

DESCRIPTION "Hulda the Witch" (more likely a misunder-

stood healer, but certainly a real person) is said to have lived on this spot. What you see is a recreation the Preserve created to tell her story which is intriguing part of the our history.





#15 Eagle Hill Lookout Point

SECTOR Pocantico

TRAIL Eagle Hill (EH)

GPS 41.613 -73.512

DESCRIPTION One of the most spectacular views in the entire

Preserve is this bench overlooking the Hudson River and the Mario Cuomo bridge. If you are lucky you might even see a bald eagle while you are up on Eagle hill. Listen, as you may hear

them before you see them.

#13 Pocantico Falls

SECTOR Pocantico

TRAIL Pocantico River Trail (PR)

GPS 41.1044 73.84631

DESCRIPTION The largest waterfall in the Preserve, this falls

can go from mighty to meager depending on the season. It's also quite striking in mid-winter

with its many ice formations.

stand inside and feel its energy. Is it a yoga



#1 Glacial Erratic

SECTOR Swan Lake

TRAIL Nature's Way (NW)

GPS 41.10852 73.84265

DESCRIPTION This glacial erratic likely hitched a ride on a

glacier in the Arctic Circle before being cast off here in the Preserve maybe 10,000 years ago. It is 20 feet high and 65 feet around and is one of

the largest in the Hudson River Valley.

Fishpond Ruins #6

SECTOR Swan Lake

TRAIL Brook Trail (BR)

DESCRIPTION In the 1900's, fish were farm raised in this fish-

> pond. Now abandoned, you can probably imagine local kids might have snuck in to swim here on a hot summer day. Weirs along this trail were said to have been put in by the Rockefellers so the King of England could fish when

he visited.

#4 **Curious Creek Crossing**

SECTOR Swan Lake

TRAIL Winter Quarters (WQ)

DESCRIPTION In these broad pastures to the left and right of

> the trial once roamed a mighty herd of David Rockefeller's breeding cattle. This natural spring-fed stream was their water source. You wont need a boat to cross but you might get

your feet wet.





#19 Foundation Ruins

SECTOR Rockwood

TRAIL Foundation Loop

GPS 41.11275 73.86583

DESCRIPTION Rockwood Hall was former home of William

Rockefeller, brother of John D. Rockefeller, both co-founders of the Standard Oil Company. The mansion at its height had 204 rooms, mak-

ing it the second-largest private house in the

U.S. at the time



#22 Sugar Shack
SECTOR Rockwood
TRAIL Upper Trail

GPS 41.11656 73.86491

DESCRIPTION We are not certain, but we believe sugar from

the surrounding sugar maples was processed here when the area was a working farm.



#21 Bridge View Benches

SECTOR Rockwood
TRAIL Lower Trail

GPS 41.11113 73.86787

DESCRIPTION One of the best views of the Hudson and the

Bridge can be seen from this bench. You may

not want to leave!

SECTOR Rockwood


TRAIL Rockwood Hall Brook Trail

GPS 41.11113 73.86787

DESCRIPTION This lovely hidden walk is missed by many visi-

tors who only see the Foundation. Don't miss this. It is a cool place in the summer with lovely shaded trees and the sound of the creek flowing past. Can you see where this creek joins

with the Hudson?



SECTOR Rockwood

TRAIL Foundation Loop

GPS 41.11103 73.86617

DESCRIPTION One of the most spectacular trees on the prop-

erty, this Sycamore stands proudly at the foundation like a sentinel. It is best viewed at a distance, however, as you climb up the Lower

Trail to return to the entrance.
